Birds Birds Birds...what have we seen and where have we seen them?

Christmas Bird Count:

The Christmas Bird Count is a way to remind ourselves that our feathered friends are still around in the winter.

The National Audubon Society recorded 2,219 counts reporting sightings of 42, 188,725 birds. That is a lot of feathered friends, even though we are losing some daily.

Closer to home, Ed Moehle oversaw the TC count conducted by 26 birders reporting 7,530 birds of 64 species. Nate Crane, in Leelanau, oversaw 21 bird counters who reported 3,273 birds of 64 species. And to round out the Tri County area was Curt Hofer, in Antrim County, who worked with 19 birders reporting 4283 birds in 56 species.

Sault Ste Marie Birding Adventure

In February of this year, our President Leonard Graf and his wife Barb took their annual trip to Sault Ste Marie.

Jerry & Sherri Freels, Larry & Cindee DuBey and Brian & 12 year old Lucas McCall joined leaders Leonard & Barbara Graf on a mid-winter birding weekend birding trip in Soo, Michigan. It was a rather mild weekend as the temperature dropped below zero degrees.

The group located 29 species. Winter specialties included excellent views of Sharptailed Grouse and Snowy Owls, although only a maximum of two. Others included Glaucous Gull, Pine and Evening Grosbeaks, Common Redpoll and Snow Bunting.

Birds usually seen but missing on this trip were Rough-legged Hawk and Northern Shrike, but there is always next year.

Otter Creek Hike March 6th

Tom Ford led his annual hike at Otter Creek. Tom was joined by 6 hikers and what a wonderful day. A bit brisk but well worth the effort. The group saw both eagles on their nest and in good lighting. What a treat. They saw Mallards, gadwalls, lesser scaups, redheads, hooded mergansers, Golden Crowned Kinglets and other songbirds. (yes they are coming back!) Tom's troop was also entertained by two Chipmunks looking for Spring. It's coming Chips.
